

PRAISE ACTIVITIES OF JEWISH WOMEN

Rabbi Gries and Other Speakers Laud Work Association Accomplishes.

Over 700 Members Enrolled in Temple Organization.

The Temple, E. 55th-st and Central-av S. E., the first Jewish Temple in which women were invited to participate on boards and committees, was crowded yesterday afternoon at the annual meeting of the Woman's Temple association.

Mrs. Joseph Sigmund Joseph, the president, was in the chair, and Rabbi Moses J. Gries, from the first a staunch supporter of the organization, spoke on the many activities for which it is noted. Martin A. Marks, president of the Temple association, also spoke.

The largest body of Boy Scouts in the city, the first Jewish Campfire circle in Cleveland, and a Sunday school of 741 members are among the achievements of the association.

A volunteer choir has been organized and sewing circles have done constant relief work through the year, the maternity circle being very active.

The association now numbers 703, nearly 100 members having been added during the last few days to bring the organization into second place among kindred societies in the United States.

In addition to the reports of officers and committees, a musical and literary program was presented yesterday.

Miss Katherine Merrill gave a reading, "The Poor Little Rich Girl." Mrs. Walter Stern rendered piano solos and Mrs. Henry Sampliner sang soprano solos. Mrs. Joseph Buchman was the accompanist.

A special alumnae day sermon will be preached by Rabbi Gries today.
