The various movements connected with the church work will soon commence. The Junior Temple society, comprising persons from fourteen to eighteen years of age, will meet each Friday evening for the study of Jewish literature and history and for miscellaneous literary work.

The Temple society, for persons over eighteen years, will broadon its scope. Numerous educational classes will be formed, the matter chosen for study being English literature, geology illustrated with stereopticen views, civics, biology, physics with experiments, botany and anthropology. Classes will be formed in other studies if twenty-five or more persons agree to enter the class. The meeting night is Wednesday and the fee is \$2. admitting to all classes.

A temple course of entertainments has been arranged. It includes the best talent that could be secured. The attractions are as follows: Oct. 16, Prof. John B. Delmore; Oct. 31, Redpath Concert Co.; Nov. 19, Royal Welch Ladies' choir; Nov. 27, George R. 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The temple society is purely non-secturian. The majority of the mem-bers of the executive board are not mem-bers of the church. Miss Clara Tagg, principal of Case avenue school, is a board member.
